

THE STATE OF WORKPLACE EDUCATION IN THE STATES *OHIO*

Funding

- 50% of the funding from federal resources
- Employers contribute through targeted funding, and in kind contributions.

Current Initiative/s

- The Northwest ABLE Resource Center (Owens College as fiscal agent) has for many years been charged with creating and sustaining professional development for the Workplace Education component of local ABLE programs in Ohio. This is paid for through federal WIA Title II State Leadership funds.

Barriers to Workplace Education

- There is difficulty in fully reporting student achievement in these programs within the parameters of the NRS. A percentage of students who are served do not get reported.

Location of programs

- 50% of programs are offered in the workplace.
- The rest of the programs are offered in:
 - LEA's, JVS/Career Center, CBO Higher Education, State Agency
